




Grade 1 A Community of Readers

One fact about Holi is that it is a Hindu festival. One opinion is that the colors are beautiful.






Hello Grade 1 Readers,


Have you ever read a graphic novel or chosen a book from the graphic stories box?

Hello Grade 1,




When we last met, we explored how picture books have different orientations. They may be tall or wide. Sometimes they are square.

Today we will practice looking carefully at the cover of a picture book to predict what may happen in the story. We'll look at both the dust jacket and the case cover.










Case cover illustration

Then we will have book time.





Hello Grade 5,




You and your partner will revisit the picture book you read in our last class, thinking about Kate's essay. Do you agree or disagree with her thinking. How does your book influence your thinking about that?

- How do window books change or influence me as a reader?






Grade 5 Inquiry & Information Literacy

This diagram shows the cycle of inquiry. What do you notice about this cycle?



Today you will use the CRAAP test to decide if other websites are real or fake.

Researchers of all ages use a variety of sources to gather information. In addition to "old school" resources like encyclopedias, books, and periodicals, the internet gives access to databases and countless websites.

During this unit you will practice three important research skills: evaluating websites, crafting keywords, and citing sources. Today we will focus on website evaluation.

Grade 5 Zine Project


Hello Grade 5,












Book of the Month Read Alike Displays
